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# A History of Quality Education

The college opened in 1900 as Marlborough High School. In 1919 the school changed its name to Marlborough College. In the mid-1930s the original single storey school was replaced with the existing two storey main block, now called the John Stewart Building.

It continued as a co-educational establishment until 1963 when Marlborough Boys' College and Marlborough Girls' College were formed.

The choice to change to single-sex schools was made in collaboration with the community, as population growth in Marlborough made a second college in Blenheim a priority.

Now, after extensive community consultation, the Ministry of Education has decided to relocate and rebuild Marlborough Boys' and Girls' Colleges. This project has been formally named Te Tātoru o Wairau.

The schools will remain as separate entities, but with some shared facilities in order to retain the best concepts of single sex education. Some boys will have classes at Marlborough Girls' College and vice versa as we offer extended curriculum options through an interchange opportunity in the senior school.

Planning for this new venture is well underway.

# Our Aim

## OUR EDUCATIVE PURPOSE

A Marlborough Boys' College (MBC) education prepares our young men for life in a future world by providing opportunities for them to be the best they can be, as people, academically, in the arts, sports, leadership and service.

The whare below depicts the key facets of opportunity for development that are provided in support of developing well-rounded students. These strong foundational pou/pillars help our young men to develop their personal character, gifts, talents and relationships to the fullest.

## OUR AIM

Marlborough Boys' College provides a broad-based education for all students before focusing on specific educational pathways based on student aspiration.

We focus on boys aspiring to "be the best that they can be" in all facets of school life. Academic achievement is valued and supported by regular guidance from Whānau teachers, subject teachers and Deans.

Our curriculum allows students to access a wide range of learning opportunities and provides multiple learning pathways. We have students undertaking diverse programmes designed to cater for their individual needs and abilities. Whether a student is aiming for excellence and scholarship or looking for entry to the trades or employment, we have programmes to support them.

Our GATE (gifted and talented) programme offers a unique education pathway for our gifted learners. It provides accelerated learning opportunities through their five years at MBC.

English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) is available for students from Years 9 to 13. Students work through progressions until they are confident to join English mainstream classes.





# Learning Focuses

## **FUTURE FOCUSED AND CONNECTED LEARNING**

We continue to develop ways of using technology in the classroom to allow students to explore new ways of learning that allow flexible and collaborative ways of working. The New Zealand School of Winegrowing, and courses such as Agriculture and Sustainable Marine Science, link learning directly to our fantastic local environment.

## **LEARNING TOGETHER**

Students make the best progress when they are valued, supported and challenged. Whānau have a key part to play in supporting their son to 'be the best they can be'. We keep family/whānau informed and part of their students' learning through three-weekly reporting against the school values, term progress, and live reporting against NCEA standards, as well as one-to-one conference meetings with our subject teachers.

When boys start at college, they join a whānau class with a teacher who, wherever possible, will remain with them for the duration of their journey with the college. This strong connection for boys and their whānau class is also a source of support and guidance through their individual academic pathway. As part of developing their self-management, boys discuss their progress and next steps in learning during extended whānau time. Together, students in a whānau class learn, foster friendships and grow.

## **VOCATIONAL PATHWAYS AND TRADES**

Marlborough Boys' College supports students into vocational pathways. The College STAR programme provides practical skills based programmes that lead to careers in the trades and/or primary industries.

Students also have the opportunity, in the senior school, to be part of the Gateway programme. Gateway is a Government initiative which supports students to investigate the career of their choice for one day per week, while still gaining credits towards NCEA. The college is also part of the Top of the South Trades Academy administered by Nelson Marlborough Institute of Technology (NMIT). Students can experience and learn about a trade on the NMIT campus or go on block courses delivered by Manaaki Tapoi.

## **NEW ZEALAND SCHOOL OF WINEGROWING**

Students who engage in this learning opportunity, funded by New Zealand Winegrowers and Cloudy Bay Winery, will experience various aspects of the industry and undertake work experience during vintage.

They gain a broad knowledge of our local industry and confidence in their ability to work in a winery or vineyard. Practical skills and an in-depth understanding of how wine is produced is developed - from growing the grapes, managing the vines, through to processing, bottling, labelling and packaging.

These options expose students to the science, technology, tourism, marketing, mechanics, and innovations within Marlborough's wine industry. The course provides a variety of Unit Standards and Achievement Standards which provide pathways to employment, further training or cadetships, or University Entrance to further their studies.

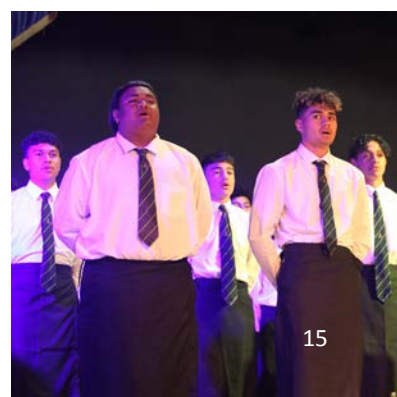

# Pastoral Support

All students are supported to be the best they can be through pastoral support at MBC.

Each student will be part of our House system that is overseen by the House Dean. They will have daily contact with a whānau teacher. Pastoral instruction is integrated into curriculum delivery with all students working on the school values of 'respect, involvement, pride, responsibility and being the best you can be'.

Additional pastoral support and instruction is provided to students individually or as a group, as and when specific needs are identified.

## SUBJECT TEACHERS

## WHĀNAU TEACHERS

Students meet as a whānau class regularly throughout the week. This enables the whānau teacher to check in and connect with each learner from a holistic wellbeing perspective.

## GUIDANCE STAFF

Are available for any student and family/whānau. Our guidance team members are Mr Jonathan Loan and Ms Julie Bousquet.

## HOUSE DEANS

MBC operates a 'school' structure, within a school' structure, with four Houses. Each Dean is responsible for a House group, working closely at all levels with both subject and whānau teachers.

## SENIOR LEADERS

Each Senior Leader works alongside a House Dean to support student and staff approaches to the Positive Behaviour for Learning (PB4L) framework and discipline.





# Houses

Every student is attached to a House at Marlborough Boys' College. We have four houses. These are named after four rivers in the Wairau region: Awatere, Waihopai, Ōpaoa and Wairau. A Dean is assigned to each House, who will oversee your child's pastoral care at school.

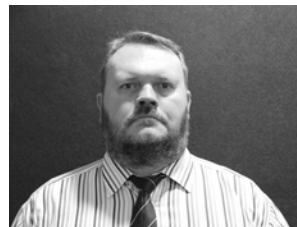

- A programme of activities outside the classroom including frequent trips in the nearby Marlborough Sounds, Nelson Lakes National Park and coastline for hiking or walks among the native flora and fauna.
- Opportunities to learn about New Zealand's Māori heritage and enjoy our community spirit.
- Recognition and appreciation of the contribution international students make to our school community, including a combined International Week and assembly with Marlborough Girls' College during Term 2.
- Diverse cultures that add a depth of learning of inclusion and tolerance of others.
- Excellent pastoral care – a safe, friendly and caring school community.
- A school with a strong academic focus that encourages all students to be involved in the arts, sports, leadership and service. We want our students to be considerate and responsible contributors to society.
